She also worked as an outreach worker for the project "Reach Out to Women from Visible Minorities - Sudanese and Somali Community" at MIAG (Multi-Cultural Inter Agency Group).

Njeri Damali Campbell, Humber College Institute of Technology & Advanced Learning

Njeri Damali Campbell is an adult educator, youth worker, facilitator, and public speaker. Drawing on over 10 years of non-profit, community development, and youth engagement experience, she delivers diversity and equity consulting and training to educators, human services sector workers, professionals, and community developers. Past Coordinator of the Regional Diversity Roundtable (of Peel) and facilitator with the Centre for Addiction & Mental Health (CAMH) education team, she provides diversity training and consulting within the human services sector.

A skilled facilitator, Njeri began delivering anti-racist education from age 15 as a motivational speaker, and television host on issues related to race, age, gender and class. Since then, she has worked with youth and adults in schools and non-profit organizations. Most notable is her work at the Ontario Young Peoples Alliance (OYPA), a provincial non-profit organization committed to youth engagement. At OYPA, Njeri developed and facilitated political literacy and community development workshops, and supported adult-led organization to integrate young people as decision makers within their organizations.

Presently, Njeri develops community, professional and personal development seminars for women and youth. Two outstanding projects that Njeri developed and implemented are PhotoOp and Shots in the Park. Both were photoethnography projects with youth at risk enabling them to have a voice to engage in local political issues through mixed media. At Sheena's Place, Njeri works with women living with eating disorders on self healing using vision boards and life writing. She also provides training and support for women to use internal resources to address social justice issues.

Njeri holds a Bachelor's degree in Sociology and Political Science, and is presently completing Graduate Studies in Education at York University. She is a recipient of the prestigious Harry Jerome award in the area of Leadership.

Dr. Adriana Carvalhal, McMaster University

Dr. Adriana Carvalhal is an Assistant Clinical Professor with the Department of Psychiatry and Behavioural Neurosciences at McMaster University and a psychiatrist with the Special Immunology Services Clinic at the

McMaster University Medical Centre. Dr. Carvalho's research and clinical work focuses on psychiatric disorders in HIV-infected people, neurocognitive disorders associated with HIV, Hepatitis C and HIV co-infection, adherence to antiretroviral treatment and health service delivery for HIV-positive populations. Dr. Carvalho is the co-Principal Investigator of the wHEALTH project.

She was the lead City witness on rental demolition cases in Toronto after repeal of the Rental Housing Protection Act, and responsible for development of housing policies for the new official plan. Katherine worked as a Policy Officer in the social housing division for the Province of Ontario, worked with the Cornell Development Group to plan one of Canada's first new 'urbanist' development in Markham, and managed rent control programs across Northern Ontario. Ms Chislett has an M.A. in geography from the University of Western Ontario, where she specialized in statistical analysis and housing program evaluation.

Ron Claus, Missouri Institute of Mental Health

Ron Claus, Ph.D. is a Research Associate Professor at the Missouri Institute of Mental Health, University of Missouri School of Medicine. His research interests center around addiction and recovery from alcohol and drug problems. In particular, he has focused on the treatment of substance use and co-occurring disorders; co-occurring capacity at treatment agencies; and gender-sensitive treatment for women. Motivation, self-help and spirituality in individuals with substance use disorders are long-standing areas of interest. Before joining MIMH in 1996, he worked for 10 years as a counsellor and clinical supervisor in the substance abuse treatment field.

Based on her extensive background in education, health care, government and community issues, she shares her expertise and contacts with a number of impressive clients and organizations. Cathy brings vitality and vision to wherever she goes and believes that youth are powerful agents for positive change.

Michelle Firestone, St. Michael's Hospital, Centre for Research on Inner City Health (CRICH)

Michelle Firestone obtained a Masters degree in Health Sciences from The Johns Hopkins School of Public Health with a focus on Social and Behavioural Interventions in 2003. Presently, she is pursuing a doctoral degree at the Dalla Lana School of Public Health at the University of Toronto. Ms. Firestone's previous work experience included two years as a project director at the University of California San Diego (UCSD) where she coordinated a multi-site research project on risks for HIV and HCV among Mexican drug users along the Mexican/U.S. border. From 2005 to 2007, Ms. Firestone worked as a research coordinator at the Centre for Addiction and Mental Health (CAMH) where her research centered primarily on illicit drug use, infectious

disease transmission and social determinants of addiction. Currently, as a doctoral student, Ms. Firestone works closely with her supervisor Dr. Patricia O'Campo at the Centre for Research on Inner City Health at St. Michael's Hospital where her research is focused mainly on concurrent mental health and substance use disorders among marginalized, urban populations.

In her last, agency-based position, Lynn was Director of Services at Supportive Housing In Peel.

Cathy Irwin, Addiction Services of Thames Valley

Cathy Irwin is the Program Manager, Fresh Start Program Addiction Services of Thames Valley. I have been with the Fresh Start Program since the beginning of the ASI program in London in July 2006. Prior to the Fresh Start Program, I worked for four years in the Substance Abuse Program at ADSTV providing addiction counselling to clients in Elgin and Middlesex County.

Prior to joining ADTSV in 2002, I worked for 12 years with youth in a variety of settings including community- based programming in children's mental health and addictions, and at an inpatient psychiatric unit for adolescents.

Jenny Katz, Frontline Partners with Youth Network

Jenny Katz has worked in a number of community and social service organizations over the last 10 years. As a result, she has learned about the shelter, youth justice, school, child protection, and children's mental health systems from the inside. In her previous position, she worked from a trauma framework as a therapist with young women with assault charges. Feeling the need to respond to the gun violence of summer 2005, she called a get-together to find out how other people working directly with youth were coping. This gathering marked the birth of the Frontline Partners with Youth Network.

Jenny continues to connect the experiences of the individuals, families and groups with whom she works, with the systemic issues that greatly contribute to, exacerbate or cause their problems. Her interest in open discussions about power and its influence on individual, organizational, and systemic relationships continues to influence all aspects of her work.

Erika Khandor is a graduate of the MSc in Health Promotion from the Department of Public Health at U of T. She currently conducts community-based research and advocacy, as the Research and Evaluation Coordinator at Street Health. Dr. Nazilla Khanlou, York University

Dr. Nazilla Khanlou: is the Ontario Women's Health Council Chair in Women's Mental Health Research in the Faculty of Health at York University and an Associate Professor in its School of Nursing. Her overall program of research is situated in the interdisciplinary field of community-based mental health promotion in general, and mental health promotion among youth and women in multicultural and immigrant-receiving settings in particular. She has received major peer-reviewed grants from federal and provincial research funding agencies, and conducted policy informing research. She has published numerous articles, books, and reports on youth, immigrant health, and mental health promotion.

Maritt Kirst, Centre for Research on Inner City Health, St. Michael's Hospital

Maritt Kirst received her PhD in Sociology, with a focus on Addiction Studies, from the University of Toronto. Her research interests pertain to social capital, the health of marginalized populations, substance use and misuse, harm reduction, crime and deviance, and mixed research methods. Dr. Kirst has worked in the addiction research area for 8 years, and her doctoral research examined the influence of network-based social capital (cognitive and structural aspects of resources, such as trust, social support and connectedness, available through social networks) on the health behaviours of marginalized drug users in Toronto. She is currently a Post Doctoral Research Fellow at the Centre for Research on Inner City Health, St. Michael's Hospital, exploring the influence of network- and neighbourhood-level social capital on the health of marginalized populations.

Laura Klie, Sunnybrook Health Sciences Centre

Laura Klie is a social worker at Sunnybrook Health Sciences Centre, HIV Clinic in Toronto and has been a member of the Coalition on HIV and Mental Health since its inception.
